Coming in at over six million years old, Kaua'i is the oldest of the main Hawaiian Islands.





Kaua'i's **Waimea Canyon** is known as "The Grand Canyon of the Pacific."





Over 60 Hollywood movies have been filmed on Kaua'i, including Jurassic Park, Outbreak, Avatar, Blue Hawai'i, and The Descendants, as well as TV shows such as Fantasy Island and Gilligan's Island.





One of the wettest spots in the world can be found on Kaua'i at Mt. Waialeale, where the average annual rainfall is about 397 inches (10 m)





The Na Pali Coast stretches along Kaua'i's north shore in a series of steep cliffs that extend into lush valleys. Once home to early Hawaiians, the cliffs can be seen from the sea via boat or helicopter, or you can hike the challenging 11-mile (17.7-km) Kalalau Trail to explore the area up close.





An abundant rooster population roams Kaua'i, most believe as a result of Hurricane Iniki's 1992 destruction setting these birds loose. The lack of mongooses or any other natural predators on the island allow the birds to flourish.







The Hawaiian Monk Seal is one of the world's rarest marine mammals. It is one of the two only remaining monk seal species. Most of the Hawaiian Monk Seal population is found within the Papahānaumokuākea Marine National Monument, off Kaua'i's north coast.
